

# UNIVERSAL DESIGN FOR LEARNING AND INCLUSION



Research indicates early childhood education supports a range of benefits including: 1,2

- increased academic preparedness for school
- increased high school graduation rates
- higher earnings in the workforce

The application of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and inclusion principles enables all children to benefit from early childhood education opportunities

#### **Universal Design for Learning (UDL)**

- Originates from Universal Design in architectural engineering<sup>3</sup>
- UDL (developed by CAST) is an **evidence-based framework** for **teaching and learning** that guides educators in meeting the **diverse needs** of **all students** <sup>4,5</sup>
- UDL reflects a **proactive** approach, whereas **differentiated instruction** is a **responsive approach** to adapting teaching and/or curricula adapted to meet individual needs<sup>6,7</sup>
  - o Best practice: UDL + differentiation, as appropriate

## **Principles of UDL**<sup>4</sup>

- 1. Multiple Means of Engagement: multiple ways to motivate students that are personally meaningful
- 2. Multiple Means of Representation: multiple modalities (e.g., visual, written, auditory) to proactively accommodate all learning styles
- 3. Multiple Means of Action and Expression: choice and flexibility in how students interact with learning materials and demonstrate knowledge

#### **Inclusion**

- Involvement of all individuals in a particular activity or setting 8
- In **early childhood education** settings: **inclusion** empowers all children to actively participate in their natural learning environments 9
- Means of removing barriers and improving outcomes for all students<sup>10</sup>
  - Evidence indicates that inclusive preschools foster positive academic and social development for both typically-developing children and those with special rights<sup>11, 12, 13</sup>

### What can you do to support UDLI?

- Learn! Become knowledgeable about the accessibility of classroom environments and curricula for all children 14
- **Communicate!** Expect your schools and teachers to promote accessible learning environments, incorporate a variety of instructional approaches, and offer various ways to measure student learning<sup>14</sup>
- Advocate! Share with your child's teachers and discuss ways to best engage your child to be inclusive of their unique identity and learning needs<sup>14</sup>
