I didn't fully understand the purpose of the lectures after spring break. I enjoyed doing a little data visualization practice but many of the concepts we discussed in class in the latter part of the course were pretty straightforward and obvious. I think I would have enjoyed learning more economic concepts/principles and/or learn more Excel skills in class (like how to build scatter plots from scratch, for example).

Have you considered a flipped classroom? I found that class time were very lecture—heavy and we rarely finished the slide decks. There were concepts at the end of the slides that I would have liked to cover. Watching the lectures at home would have solidified course content. Then it would be nice to work on the assignments in small groups in the class.

Use poll everywhere! Would have been really helpful to have mini 'quizzes' throughout the lectures to ensure I understood.

we can't see your mouse pointer via Zoom. (btw I really appreciate the Zoom option!)

Leave enough time to do the poll everywhere questions during the first 6 weeks of class. The times that we used this tool to check understanding and facilitate in-class discussion were helpful.

An assignment every week was a little aggressive especially because some of them took far longer than is worth for 5 points without improving the lesson.

The midterm feels too rushed. The weekly assignments also feel very fast-paced and tiring to keep up with.

Not sure if this is possible, but I think moving this course to a smaller space would encourage participation. I shared pretty frequently, but I think Friedman courses are usually livelier than this one.

I would love more direct connections between the first half of the class and the second half. I needed a bit more of the connections explicitly laid out for me.

There is nothing to improve in this course, this class is perfect.

Many of the assignments have very long instructions, which makes it difficult to figure out what we are actually supposed to be doing. I recommend editing these instructions for brevity and clarity. I also think that the course content for the second half of the term could be more incorporated into the main topic of the class.

We need to have more discussion and engagement during the class. I understand the desire to get through slides, but the lack of engagement, especially at in a 4 pm class, can feel really distancing. The last week of class was the most engaging it ever was, but even still, it could have benefitted from better discussion opportunities.

Anything is great.

Course slides were overpopulated with text and graphics so it was often hard to follow along/take notes during class. I would prefer an assignment deadline on a weekday rather than Sunday. It would be useful to include more examples of how to navigate datasets online or the creation of different graphs during class rather than just showing the end result.

I went in super intimidated by econ and left the class with a totally new framework for thinking about food systems. Thank you Will!


Some of the weekly assignments (especially the ones after the midterm) took a very long time to complete and were outside the normal time expectations for a weekly assignment.

The classroom needs to not be in the auditorium.


I wish professors could reduce some of the controversial topics in class. For example, the issue between China and Taiwan. This issue is very, very complex, and I don't think "invasion" should be used to describe China's actions against Taiwan. Because mainland China has been administering the land of Taiwan for thousands of years, and this land has been the same country as China for tens of millions of years. Including Taiwan's current constitution, it is written that China and Taiwan are both part of the "Republic of China". During World War II, China was invaded by Japan. Taiwan and the northeastern part of China were the first areas to fall. However, after Japan's defeat, Taiwan was returned to China. A civil war also broke out in China at that time. Mao Zedong's government occupied mainland China, while Chiang Kai—shek's government retreated to Taiwan. But this does not prevent us from being the same country. There are now two regimes in many countries in the world, such as Palestine and Yemen. Although there are two regimes, they all belong to the same country. It is true that there are many people on the island of Taiwan who advocate Taiwan independence and hope that Taiwan will join the United Nations. But what I want to say is that the Chinese government has clearly stated that it has no intention of organizing these people to establish an independent country, but they should not establish a country on Chinese territory.
