Qualifications for Internship at CHS

- No technical qualifications
- Passion for the project
- Willingness to learn
- Willingness to ask questions when you don't know the answer
- Ability to work with a highly motivated and responsive community of helpers

Overview of internships at CHS

- Three college undergraduates per summer, 20 hours per week, \$12/hour plus lodging and free lunch five days a week
- Selected from a big pool – over 120 applicants each year
- Interns live, work, and play together: they have time to relax and a great non-circulating library in Classics available to them
- Crash course in the technologies they need, provided by Lia and Lenny; crash course in navigating DC and its surroundings by Program managers of CHS, Allie and Lanah
- Some take summer courses at Catholic U. and the Goethe-Institut
- Membership in a summer community of researchers of all ages and many cultures

Overview of Workflow for 1st1K/OGL

- Begin with good scans of copyright-free texts (according to the German, not the US copyright law)
- OCR of texts run by Bruce Robertson and his interns
- Machine readable text sent to DDD for EpiDoc encoding
- Texts sent to Leipzig team (Matt Munson and Annette Geßner) for boilerplate editing, addition to Github Repository for the project, and initial vetting with Hooktest
- Interns troll the Github Issues list for errors in text encoding that they have learned how to fix
- After corrections, interns **push** (github term) their corrected Github repo up the line for verification and approval by members of the Leipzig team
