Aesthetics: Beauty and Art

Materials: Paper, pens, Play-Doh

Goal: Explore definitions of beauty. Distinguish objective and subjective traits within beauty and art

Warmup:

- The students take three minutes to write down some things they find beautiful (Either examples of beauty in their lives or traits that make something beautiful)
- Students briefly share what they wrote

Activity:

- Take 10 minutes to make something you find beautiful
- Zoe creates a neutral work (not conventionally beautiful), Ezra creates a work that is conventionally unbeautiful
- Students share their items one by one
- Zoe shares her work: Do the students find Zoe's work beautiful?
- Ezra shares his work: Do the students find Ezra's work beautiful?

General Discussion on activity:

- Why did you decide to make what you made?
- What made certain works beautiful? What made them not beautiful?
- Are there any traits of an object that are universally beautiful?
- Is living/life itself beautiful? What is meant when someone says "life is beautiful?"

Discussion on art (if time permits):

- What is the difference between beauty and art?
- How can we judge what is and is not art?
- Is all art beautiful?
- Does intention matter in creating art?
- Can actions be art? (think about performing arts)

Concluding thoughts:

How do our perceptions of beauty influence the way we live our lives? How can it be productive? How can it be harmful?
