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### Lesson: Metaphysics and Personal Identity

#### Goals

- Question: What makes You You?
  - Persistence & Change
- Students will be able to understand and identify essential and accidental properties of objects and people
- Students will critically examine and develop hypothetical scenarios in which questions of personal identity is uncertain

• Students will critically evaluate the way they stay the same or change over time

## Logistics

- Be sure to arrange desks in a circle and include space for instructors to sit during discussions
- Philosophy Journals and writing utensils

# I. Opening Activity (5 min)

- Free write: Have students write down 5 properties that described them when they were 5 years old, and 5 qualities that describe them now.
- (Turn and Talk/Pair and Share) are there any repeats? Is the list completely different?
  - If the lists are totally different: can you say you're the same person?

# II. Activity Agree/Disagree Sides of the Room

Are you the same after....

- A haircut, Dying your hair, Getting a piercing, Getting a tattoo
- Losing a limb, Losing 2 limbs
- Personality change, Losing all your memories
- Having your brain/memories put into a robot to impersonate you

# III. Discussion

- Essential vs. Accidental Properties
  - Essential: Property that an object *must* have
    - A book must have pages in it
    - Accidental: Something an object has but could lack
      - A book could have a jacket or not
- Talk about <u>essential</u> vs <u>accidental</u> Properties
  - Brainstorm essential vs accidental qualities of a person
  - In groups or Free write?
- Hypotheticals to illustrate
  - Zoe's Hypothetical: Different presentations of self online
    - A lot of us use multiple social media platforms to communicate/broadcast ourselves, but each platform has a different tone/aesthetic/etc. Which

online iteration is the most "You"? Are none of them you? Are all of them you? What do your online representations of yourself say about you?

- Replication of a person
  - Swan Song "When a loving husband and father is diagnosed with a terminal illness, he's presented with a controversial alternative solution to shield his family from his loss replace himself with a carbon copy clone."
  - Robot that has the same personality as you that would live forever
  - Marvel's WandaVision
    - REAL Vision (w/ memories) vs. VISION 2.0 (w/o memories)
      - When REAL Vision gives VISION 2.0 the memories, who is the real Vision?
- Have them offer hypotheticals!
