Class 6: Aesthetics

#### Materials:

- Pictures of sculptures
- Legos or building blocks
- Play Doh

# <u>Goals:</u>

- Consider ideas of beauty related to built objects and the built world
- Consider whether medium (sculpting/building material) has an effect on beauty
- Consider whether things with utility (homes) can also be beautiful and whether form or function should be prioritized

### Timeframe (minutes):

Time	Activity
10 min	Introduction
10 min	Styles of art
25 min	Sculpting with Play Doh, Legos

### Activities:

- A. Introduction: 10 min
  - a. Names and pronouns, "Have you ever been to a museum?" (what type?)
  - b. Reminder of group rules: Raise your hand to talk, disagree respectfully, ask before you can touch things, take turns when sharing
  - c. Short discussion:
    - i. What's a museum? Are there different types?
    - ii. Who decides what goes in a museum?
    - iii. Do you always like what you see in a museum?
    - iv. What makes a museum good?
- B. Styles of art activity: 10 min
  - a. Print out pictures of different styles of sculpture– separate so they can be passed around, looked at closer– all representations of the human form
    - i. What do you think of these sculptures? Do they have anything in common? What's different about them?
    - *ii.* What do you like in these sculptures? Are some of them better than others? Why? (form, representation, colors)

- 1. These are sculptures- do you feel like you can get the full idea from a photograph? Can you tell how big they are?
- iii. What are the different sculptures made of? Do you think it was a good idea to use X to make that? Does the thing that it's made of change how much you like it?
  - 1. Is it still art if it's made of something that people don't usually make art from?
- iv. All of these sculptures are representations of people (even the more abstract ones). Does that change how you feel about them?
- C. Sculpting Activity: 25 min
  - a. First: Play Doh: make an animal: say you have 3 minutes and use a phone timer
    - i. As they are sculpting: why did you choose that animal?
    - ii. Show and tell
    - iii. What makes a Play Doh sculpture (built object) beautiful?1. Form, color, representation, how complicated it is
    - iv. Are there some things you think it would be really hard to make out of Play Doh?
  - b. If we were to give you Legos, would it be harder to make an animal?
  - c. Give Legos: make a house (or an animal if you want) 3 minutes again
    - i. As they are building: what are you adding to your house? Why?
      - 1. Are you adding this so that it's useful or so that it's beautiful?
    - ii. Show and tell
    - iii. Are there some things you think it would be really hard to make out of Legos?
    - iv. Would it be easier to make the house out of Play Doh? Would it be easier to make an animal out of Legos?
    - v. What makes a Lego sculpture (built object) beautiful?
      - 1. Form, color, representation, how complicated it is
      - 2. If one house is a more functional house than another (e.g. has more rooms, has better appliances), does that change how beautiful it is? Is a functional house more beautiful?
    - vi. Do the things that make a Lego structure beautiful also make a Play Doh sculpture beautiful?
    - vii. Do people have different styles that they go for in their sculptures?
      - 1. If we disagree, does one of us have to be wrong?
  - d. Free build activity: Legos OR Play Doh
    - i. If students connect with the museum concept: We're going to make a sculpture museum. You can build anything you want for the sculpture museum. Go!

- 1. Emphasize that whatever they choose to build IS museum quality because it will go in OUR museum
- ii. Questions during building:
  - 1. What are you sculpting? Why do you think that thing should go in a museum?
  - 2. Do you think what you're sculpting is beautiful? Do things in a museum *have* to be beautiful?
    - a. Have you ever seen something in a museum that you thought wasn't beautiful?
  - 3. If your sculpture was made out of something different (e.g. cheese, stone), would it be more/less beautiful?
  - 4. Do you think that only really good artists get their artwork in a museum? Since we're putting your artwork in a museum, doesn't that mean you're a really good artist too?
- D. Conclusion: Bye everyone!
