Ella Gillespie and Essex Gall Aesthetics Lesson Plan Total Time: 40-45 mins <u>Materials:</u> The Dot, paper, crayons/colored pencils

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Discuss why we like the way some things look and sound and don't like the way other things look and sound
- 2. Discuss what counts as art
- 3. Discuss if there is a delay in recognizing something as beautiful, or if you know instantly.

Introduction (5 mins)

- Re-enforce hand raising as our method for taking turns to speak.
- Ask everyone to share what they think the most beautiful picture is/would look like?
- Conversation demo:
 - Essex: I think the most beautiful picture would have a boat in it.
 - Ella: Why is the boat in the picture?
 - Essex: When I see a shiny boat, it looks so even on both sides. That's beauty.
- Continuously ask if they think a given object in the picture is beautiful, and why it is beautiful.
 - Reasons for beauty should hopefully move towards a feeling, not necessarily a physical characteristic.
- An easy topic to revert to is colors; ask if certain colors are beautiful or ugly.
- What do you think counts as art?

Reading Activity: The Dot (10-15 mins)

- Do you think that the dot that Vashti draws is beautiful?
- Do you ever go into a museum and see a piece of abstract art that you think you could have drawn?
- Do you think that art needs to look realistic? Does it need to look like real life?
- What do you think counts as art? Does the squiggle that the little boy draws count as art?
- Vashti didn't make the dot to be art, she just made the dot. Is it still art if that's not what we intended?

Transition Movement Activity: Flying (3 mins)

- Ask them to demonstrate how an ugly bird might fly versus a beautiful bird.
- If they demonstrate different ways of flying for ugly and beautiful birds, ask why they think there is a difference.

Activity: Museum art vs. Child's art (5 mins)

- Show the kids several pieces of art done by adults and several done by children. Have them guess which is which.

Transition Activity: ugly and beautiful sounds (5 mins)

- Listen to some beautiful noises in our environment and ask the kids if they think they sound beautiful
 - Listen to the birds chirping outside
 - Listen to the leaves rustling
- Ask the kids to take turns standing up and making one beautiful sound and one ugly sound
 - After everyone has gone we can discuss why or why not these sounds are beautiful or ugly

Activity: Drawing (10 mins)

- Ask each one to choose their favorite and least favorite colored crayon/marker. Have everyone draw something beautiful with their least favorite color, and something ugly with their favorite color.
- Discussion: Does your favorite color (which they hopefully consider beautiful) make an ugly thing beautiful, and vice versa?

Concluding Questions (2 mins)

- What is the difference to you between something being beautiful and being ugly?
- Are we happy with the description of this difference?
