Moral/Ethical Relativism

Essential Question: *Is morality relative? Are there any objective truths?*

Objectives:

Have students consider the status (?) of their own moral viewpoints, the potential moral value of respecting another's moral beliefs, and how the two intersect/conflict.

Intro(Relative Beliefs):

Is it important to respect others' beliefs?

- Religious Practices (Sam)
 - Ex. non-Kosher food should probably not be given to Jewish customer
 - I am not Jewish, so I can eat all the bacon I want. That doesn't mean I should give a Jewish person a BLT
- Personal Wishes (Sam)
 - Even beyond broader cultural behaviors, personal preferences are similarly relative
 - Ex. Maybe I don't like people touching my jacket. You might not mind if someone touches yours, but it bothers me.
 - So, don't touch my jacket
- Extra: How to raise a kid (Jazmyne)
 - Access to electronics(when?)
 - Grounding kids
 - Physical punishment

Activity (Jazmyne)

- Do you have the same moral beliefs as your classmates?
 - Think of an example where your own moral beliefs differ from another student's
 - You may speak with a partner to find such a difference if you cannot think of one off of the top of your head
 - If nobody can think of anything, propose a version *trolley problem* to hopefully find varied opinions
 - Ventilator version

Discussion(Moral Relativism): (Sam)

- Does the importance of respecting beliefs extend to moral issues?
 - Different cultures have different standards for what is moral and what is not
 - Can the moral value of actions within a certain context be evaluated under the standards of another context?

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- Extreme example: Individual bad people might feel that there is no moral weight to harming another person.

Does that mean they should be able to harm others without resistance?

- Most would probably say no
- Is the individual different from the entire society?
 - Ex. Society of baby-murderers
- What makes moral relativism different from other relativism?
 - Actions impact another person
 - The importance of certain moral issues overrules the positive of respecting beliefs in certain cases
- Intent
 - Is intent the only thing that matters for moral weight?
 - If so, can anyone act unethically?
 - Maybe I think my actions don't accord with general ethical standards, but, if I felt my actions were wrong, I would not make them. Instead, my ethical standards are just different.
 - Therefore, I am acting ethically always.

Discussion(Real-World Example)

- Puerto Rican Cockfighting (Sam)
 - Animal Abuse
 - Different from factory farming?
 - Maybe neither should be allowed
 - Just b/c one isn't stopped, doesn't mean the other shouldn't be
 - Very important to PR culture
 - History of imperialist overreach, etc
 - History
 - Supreme Court banned it
 - Should cockfighting be permitted in Puerto Rico?
 - Also a positive economically
 - 11k jobs, a \$65m annual boost to the economy
 - Is this important?
- Extra: Honor-Killing (Jazmyne)
 - Istanbul: 14-y-o girl raped
 - Her family feels she has dishonored them
 - Kill her to regain honor
 - Right to them
 - Not right by our standards
 - Morality?
